Executive Summary

First Selectman's Office

- 0% increase budget passed, Town 626-290, Board of Education 561-354
- S&P upheld Seymour's AA+ bond rating
- OPEB Trust Fund established will allow Town to put aside money for retiree benefits to stabilize tax rate
- Union contract negotiations completed. All employees will move to a high-deductible healthcare plan resulting in substantial savings
- 2017 road work began Rennay Road, Kulas Terrace, Bellevue Terrace, Emma Street, Nichols Street, French Street, Spruce Street, Roberts Street, North Main Street, Mountain Road, Bunting Road, Cherry Street, Colony Road, Lorraine Avenue, Curry Hill Road, Wood Street and Gloria Avenue
- Selectmen voted to authorize restructuring of organizational chart in continuing efforts to streamline and improve efficiency
- Sustainability Committee formed to help guide Town's greening efforts
- 4th annual Cinco de Mayo Taco-Eating Contest held, raising thousands for TEAM Inc. and Meals on Wheels
- Earth Day cleanup held at Socchrin's Pond. Over 1,500 pounds of trash removed.

The second quarter of 2016 was mainly occupied with budget preparations. A level budget, holding the Town at 36 mills, was passed at referendum on Thursday, May 11. The budget includes money designed to stabilize the budget in the face of any cuts from the State of Connecticut, which is experiencing significant fiscal uncertainty look unlikely to pass a budget in the near future. Despite remaining flat, our budget allows Seymour to proceed with new initiatives to keep the Town moving forward.

Shortly after the budget passed, Seymour's AA+ bond rating was upheld by ratings agency Standard & Poor's, despite the recent downgrade of the State of Connecticut and Hartford. They cited our very strong economy, strong management, strong budgetary performance and flexibility and were very positive overall. The assigned interest rate for the \$6 million bond issue approved at referendum in November 2016 was 2.41%.

Another contributing factor to this rating was the establishment of the Town's OPEB Trust Fund. The OPEB (other post-employment benefits) liability is the cost of providing non-pension benefits to retired municipal employees. The Town's current liability stands at approximately \$36 million, but this number is expected to decrease after a new actuarial report is issued in late 2017 and will continue to decrease thereafter due to changes in union contracts. New employees are no longer eligible for retiree healthcare and employee healthcare plans are less expensive for both employees and the Town. The new trust fund allows the Town to put aside money to draw from in years where expenses are high instead of paying out-of-pocket.

2017 roadwork has begun and is expected to come in significantly under-budget, which will allow us to do more roads. By the time the \$4.5 million in road bond money is spent, the Seymour will have repayed over 30% of roads within the past 6 years. We will continue to make necessary

investments in infrastructure in the coming years as we work our way through a backlog of crucial construction.

We have already significantly changed the Town's internal structure. By combining IT and now Operations with the Board of Education, we are exploiting economies of scale to save money and also reducing the administrative burden on the Town. The latest change will see a member of the staff of my office changing roles to a project manager. This will ensure the timely completion of large-scale projects and increase the amount that can be accomplished.

Finally, the Town is increasing its emphasis on sustainability with an eye towards savings. I served as chairman of the Connecticut Conference of Municipality's Sustainability Committee and in that capacity I saw the savings that improving the Town's sustainability could lead to. We have already begun the money-saving green initiatives: LED streetlight conversions, increasing recycling and decreasing garbage and moving to a paperless environment wherever possible. We look forward to saving Seymour some green.
